Power Verbs

Summarizing, rather than analyzing, is one of the chief pitfalls of AP rhetorical analysis. Bland verbs, such as *says* or *relates* or *use/utilize*, tend to lead the reader into writing a summary unintentionally. Powerful verbs and verb phrases, when used correctly, will make your writing more analytical and incisive.
